Our Rector writes:

The Right Reverend Bishop Graham was speaking on Radio Norfolk recently about his retirement and his final service at Norwich cathedral on November 25th. He installed and licensed me to this benefice nearly a year ago, on a dark rainy night and it was Bishop Graham who ordained me priest at Norwich cathedral, following my ordination as deacon in Tenerife. When the “Beast from the East” hit us last winter and it was apparently the worst winter for about seven years and my first back in the U.K. after a lifetime in Spain and the Canaries, it made sense that my husband and I had moved to Spain all those years ago! A long hot summer followed. My Spanish “moggies” had seen snow for the first time and then encountered the long heatwave but with no lizards in sight. They used to line up the bodies on the terrace. Now they bring in mice and birds. Charles and Chispi have settled down well and they have helped me to feel at home.* It is not difficult when one is in a caring and friendly community.

Rural life goes on. There are the inevitable funerals, when we are able to support grieving families and give them comfort, providing a farewell for their loved one, with dignity. There will be much thought behind the choice of hymns, songs, readings and other music.

Wider afield, Montserrat Caballé, the world famous Spanish opera singer died recently, leaving behind her a glorious legacy of beautiful music. We will never forget the duo she sang with Freddie Mercury, “Barcelona” at the opening of the Olympic games there. Two great artists from different worlds merged together to create something quite unique.

And Dr Who is a woman! What is the world coming to?

Thirty men (based on the Rolls of Honour and additional research) from our six parishes fell in the First World War. What follows are only fragments of a few of their stories, and is more about their deaths than about their lives.

The first to lose his life was Able Seaman **Robert Winn** of Briningham, aged thirty and married less than a year, who was drowned in the sinking of H M S *Cressy* in the first weeks of the war. A U-Boat, the U-9, torpedoed the ship off the coast of Holland, with a loss of 560 crew. In those early days of the war the threat from U-boats was not always fully appreciated and the *Cressy's* sister ships the *Aboukir* and the *Hogue* were also sunk on 22 September 1914 with appalling loss of life.

The captain of the U-boat which sank the *Cressy* was Otto Weddigen. He was later awarded the *Pour le Merite*, Prussia's highest military decoration, by the Kaiser. But he did not survive the war. The following year, while commanding the U-29, he was killed when his submarine was rammed by HMS *Dreadnought*.

The **Buckle boys**, from Hunworth, died in another theatre of war, in Egypt. George William and Cecil were the sons of the Hunworth Hall farm bailiff, Herbert Buckle. Dr Henry Crawley, the present owner of Hunworth Hall, recalls that the names of the boys were on a list of those resident at the Hall - 'The lads would have slept in our attics'. By coincidence, Henry Crawley's grandfather was also serving in the Middle East at the same time.

It is hard to imagine the effect on two Norfolk country boys of being pitched into war so far away and in such a different world. Cecil, the younger of them, was only twenty when he died in 1916 serving with the Army Service Corps in the Motor Ambulance Depot. His brother died of wounds the following year. The double blow to their father was brutal, as the boys were his only sons.

Charles Calver of Thornage was serving near Noyelles in December 1917 in the 9th Battalion, Norfolk Regiment. The *History of the Norfolk Regiment* describes the 1st December as a day of heavy shelling and air attacks. An attack on Cantaing having failed, in the evening the battalion relieved the 9th Suffolks in the front line. On the following day, the story was much the same. The Battalion War Diary states that:

There was constant hostile shelling all day.

The enemy appeared to be very strong in artillery.

On 2nd December Charles Calver, aged 27, met his death in that hail of shellfire. He was buried in Flesquieres Hill British Cemetery, near Cambrai.

Bombardier **Sidney Cousins** of Swanton Novers was one of the youngest of the fallen from the benefice, aged just twenty, and the only son of Walter, who until 1909 was licensee of the Blue Bell Inn, and his wife Kezia. By 1911, Walter was a farmer and job master at Bell Farm. Sidney himself worked at Eye Green railway station as a Goods Clerk before enlisting in London.

Sidney served with the Royal Garrison Artillery as a Bombardier in a Heavy Trench Mortar Battery. 60-Pounder heavy field guns were a commonly used weapon, and the first to be hauled by motor tractors rather than horse power. Some of the guns were so large that they could only be deployed on railway tracks.

He was awarded the DCM (Distinguished Conduct Medal) for 'distinguished, gallant and good conduct in the field', a medal given to Other Ranks and NCOs and the second highest award for gallantry in action after the Victoria Cross. It was reserved for acts of exceptional bravery.

Sidney died of wounds on 9 July 1918, near Lens and Bethune, a victim of the counter-attack to the German Spring Offensives. He is buried in Aix-Noulette Communal Cemetery Extension, Nord-Pas-de-Calais, France, and his parents paid to have an inscription on his gravestone: *Greater Love Hath No Man Than This*. He was engaged to Miss D Atkinson of Eye and is also listed on that town's Roll of Honour.

It has not been possible to identify with certainty all of the thirty men from the benefice who fell. It is much *more* difficult to retrieve the names and the stories of those who returned. We hear often that in the First World War a generation was lost. That is not strictly true. In the UK, six million men were mobilised, of whom about 700,000 were killed - about 11.5%. Millions more men and women died around the world of course, from famine and disease as well as on active service.

But what of the other roughly 88%? They were an afflicted generation, many physically injured and mentally scarred, often living out their lives revealing little or nothing about their war experiences. One hundred years on from that suddenly silent morning of 11 November 1918, it is important that, however imperfectly, we remember them too.

As this is very much an incomplete record at present I would be grateful for any comments or additional information.

Almost the last feather I received was on a bus. I was sitting near the door when I became aware of two women on the other side talking at me, and I thought to myself, 'Oh Lord, here we go again'. I didn't pay much attention. However I suppose I must have caught their eye in some way because one lent forward and produced a feather and said, 'Here's a gift for a brave soldier'. I took it and said, 'Thank you very much - I wanted one of those'. Then I took my pipe out of my pocket and put the feather down the stem and everything and worked it in a way I've never worked a pipe cleaner before. When it was filthy I pulled it out and said, 'You know we didn't get those in the trenches' and handed it back to her. She instinctively put out her hand and took it, so there she was sitting with this filthy pipe cleaner in her hand and all the other people on the bus began to get indignant. Then she dropped it and got up to get out, but we were nowhere near a stopping place and the bus went on quite a long way while she got well and truly barracked by the rest of the people on the bus. I sat back and laughed like mad.

In remembrance of Animals in War

The Animals in War memorial was unveiled in 2004. Located at Brook Gate on Park Lane in London, it represents all animals which served, suffered and died with the British Imperial and Allied forces over the course of the 20th century as a whole. At its core is a large curved Portland stone wall with animals engraved in profile. They include one or more of a camel, elephant, glow worm and pigeon. A horse, mule and dog approach the wall. The inscription concludes 'They had no choice'.


Consultation on Norfolk's Children's Centres: The consultation is now open and will close on 9 November '18. The consultation document can be found on: www.norfolk.gov.uk/childrenscentres. Entitled 'Transforming our Children's Centres' which includes a proposal to retain 7 of the current 53 centres as early childhood and family service bases. If you access any of the maps please note Wells Division is presently covered by Wells, Stibbard, Holt and Corpusty 'reach area' and Fakenham 'reach area'.

Park & Ride Charges: There has been some concern as to whether charges were to increase, however NCC's Passenger Traffic Manager reports that we are not expecting any changes in the near future.

Norfolk Swift Response: I have been asked by grateful recipients of Norfolk Swift Response to make this service known to a wider audience so here goes: Norfolk County Council operates a 24 hr countywide Norfolk Swift Response Service. This service is available to people living in the community over the age of 18 who require physical or practical support with daily living tasks. Help can be given with: Falls - if the person is uninjured but unable to get up support can be offered; Personal care; Welfare checks; Support for informal carers in an emergency. The service provides a response to urgent and or unplanned needs, this may be a one off intervention or could be providing support until a resolution can be found to meet the person's need. The Service aims to reduce hospital admissions and admissions to 'respite' by being able to respond quickly to service users and their carers who find themselves in a crisis. The website is due for an update but is still very useful: <https://www.norfolk.gov.uk/care-support-and-health/care-and-support/urgent-help/how-to-get-urgent-help> This service is free.

Coast Hopper: There was rumour and conjecture that the Coast Hopper was to be suspended for 8 weeks whilst work on a wall along Stiffkey road was carried out. After discussion by NCC with the Traffic Management Company a priority board was organised and Sanders issued the notice that whilst lights might delay Stiffkey buses heading into Wells and affect services from Wells to Cromer and North Walsham the drivers would do their best to keep on time. Sanders are to be congratulated for their patience and efforts to avoid passenger disappointment.




